Montana Ag Summit Speaker to Address Why Too Big Is Failing

The rules seek to make it clear that the law has teeth, and can and will be enforced. These Rules extend consistent, though sometimes soft, USDA policy that has characterized every presidential administration since Warren Harding," Domina said.

Domina has addressed similar topics in recent months at the historic joint U.S. Department of Justice and Department of Agriculture workshops on markets held at Fort Collins, Colo., and attended by Attorney General Eric Holder and Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack. He also spoke at annual meetings of the Independent Cattlemen of Nebraska, the Kansas Cattlemen's Association and the Wyoming Livestock Association State Fair meeting.
